The diagram below summarizes the relationship between key principles of good governance and sustainable development.

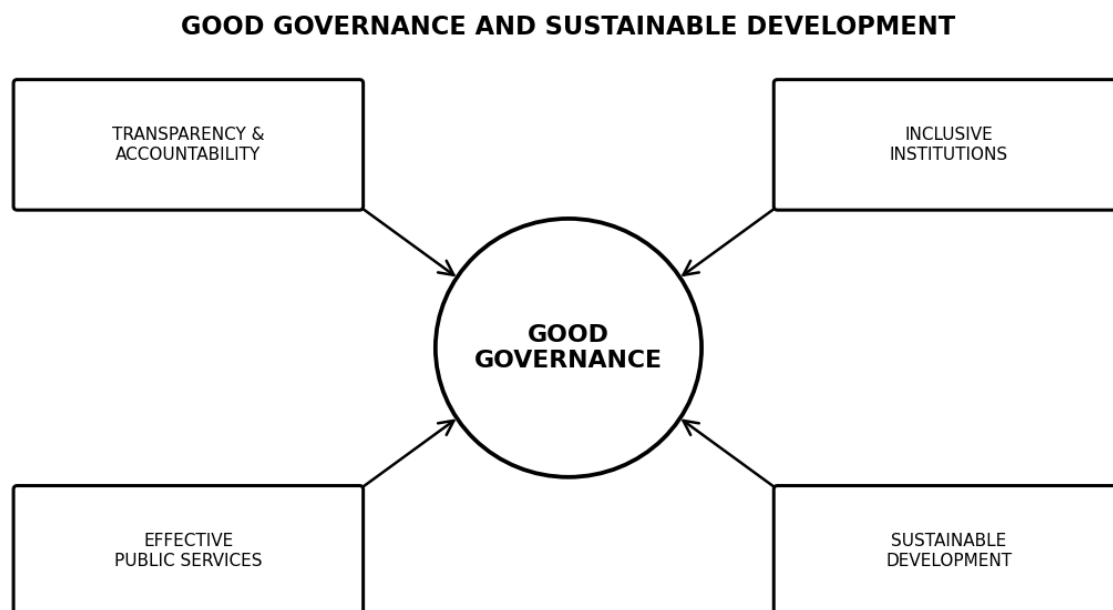


Figure 1. Simplified overview of good governance and sustainable development.
